## **Topdressing as a Winter Stress Prevention Strategy**

#### By Adam Thoms, Iowa State University

Topdressing is one of the most critical practices for quality turfgrass but is also one of the most misunder-stood and abused cultural practices that turfgrass managers conduct. Frequent sand-topdressing with pure sand was first described by John Madison in 1974, who noted that a uniform sand sized 0.05-1.0 mm should be used at a rate of 3 cu. ft. per 1,000 sq. ft. every three weeks in California up to 15 times per year. The original program was designed to limit the formation of layers of thatch and root zone material trapping thatch, ensuring that water flowed through the profile. Water will flow through a root zone freely if there is a coarse material over a fine material. However, once a finer material (one in which smaller particle sizes are present in greater numbers) ends up in the profile then the finer material must be fully saturated before water can move to the next layer below which slows the whole profile.

The sand-topdressing program was amended in 1981 to account for different sizes from the original recommendation that were in the range of 0.1-1.0 mm , and noted that sand availability should be accounted for when starting a frequent topdressing program. Having to change sand sources frequently will lead to changes in particle size, which could result in layering in the root zone profile. Establishing a good flow of water through the profile is critical for soils to avoid water backing up on the surface, which could result in ice formation and winter damage. Regular hollow tine aerification with the addition of sand-topdressing will allow water to continue to move into the profile. Often golf courses will debate the need to continue a sand-topdressing program especially if budgets are limiting, but the advice is generally that once a sand-topdressing program is started it should not be stopped.

Sand topdressing is also often used before winter to help protect turfgrass plants from winter desiccation, which is the loss of water due to being exposed to dry winter winds in the absence of snow cover. Many golf courses will add a heavy sand-topdressing after the final mow and after irrigation blowout to the putting green surface to help protect the crown of the plant from winter desiccation. The sand-topdressing rates for winter putting green protection are often debated, so additional research is needed, but 3 cu. ft. per 1,000 sq. ft. is what is often used by superintendents. A WinterTurf research project led by Dr. Kevin of Michigan State University focusing on sand-topdressing for winter protection is being initiated this winter at several locations, so check back this summer to see the findings.

### **Tree Leaf Mulching Impacts on Lawn Health**

Much of the US is in the midst of beautiful fall foliage, but as those leaves fall to the ground, they can cause some serious environmental problems. A US Geological Survey study commissioned by the Clean Lakes Alliance in Madison, WI found that nearly 80% of the annual phosphorus load into Madison lakes came from tree leaves piled on the street for pickup in the fall. Mulching these tree leaves into lawns could reduce phosphorus leaching into lakes and also reduce the municipal labor costs required to pick up the curbside leaves, but the potential impact of leaving those tree leaves on lawn health in the spring is poorly understood.

As part of our USDA-funded WinterTurf research project we are investigating the impact of multiple depths of mulched and non-mulched tree leaves on turfgrass quality, snow

mold development, and multiple soil health metrics such as soil respiration. The study was initiated in the fall of 2022 and is being conducted at research locations in Madison, WI and East Lansing, MI. Leaves were either mulched using a mulching lawn mower or left unmulched and piled at a depth of 2 inches (buried within the turf canopy) or at a depth of 6 inches (fully covering the turfgrass) (Figure 1).

Snow mold and turfgrass quality results were collected during the spring of 2023 and those treatments where the leaves were mulched were in excellent health, even at the deeper leaf depth, while the deeper level of unmulched leaves caused serious damage to the turf (Figure 2). Multiple additional differences between treatments were still evident during the middle of summer. First, the plots damaged by the leaf smothering had mostly fully recovered; however, there were higher levels of weeds in these plots because there was open canopy in the spring while the turfgrass recovered from the damage. The other important aspect was that the grass in the plots with the heavier depth of leaves, both mulched and unmulched, was a darker green color for much of the summer. This is likely due to nutrient release from the greater level of organic

matter present on those plots and also potentially due to higher water holding capacity in those plots due to the higher organic matter content. This study will be going on for several more years, but after just one year we're starting to get a feel for the multiple possible benefits available to the turf when tree leaves are mulched into a lawn in the fall.
